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Places

Collegium Nowodworski

- building of the Jagiellonian University located at ul. Św. Anny 12. Bartłomiej Nowodworski (hence the name) bequeathed the building to the university for the first secular secondary school existing at the university from 1586. Nowodworski's college architecturally refers to the Late Gothic Collegium Maius, and is famous for its arcaded baroque courtyard.

High school in 1898 moved to a new location at pl. Na Groblach. Nowodworski Collegium was made available to the Jagiellonian Library, and from 1949 to the then Medical Academy (today's Collegium Medicum).



The Aula


The old theologians lecture room belongs to the oldest part of Collegium Maius. It is located on the site of the tenement house owned by Pecherz of Rzeszotary, which was purchased by King Ladislaus the Jagiellonian and bequeathed to the University in 1400. Over the centuries theology lectures were given here, and currently it still serves the University as a stately assembly room. The Aula is a place for honorary degree and post-doctoral degree (habilitation) ceremonies, but also for conferences and music concerts. The inscription engraved on the stone portal reads Plus ratio guam vis ("Let reason rule and not might") and now this is the Jagiellonian University's official motto.



Stuba Communis

Up to the 18th century European scholars lived in colleges. Collegium Maius hosted theologians and some liberal arts professors.

Stuba Communis is the common room built in 1430, where twice a day all would meet for meals and sometimes for discussion. Like in the medieval period, three tables forming a horseshoe still stand here. There is an oriel opposite to the tables, where once the youngest of all the scholars would read the Holy Bible and excerpts from the works of the Church Fathers. Academic life in the past was similar to that of a monastic community.



The restaurant is located in one of the most beautiful tenements in the heart of the Krakow Market Place. Its interiors are distinctively connected with the historic character of the building. The restaurant is set beneath a gothic, crossshaped coping, where the carvings on the vault keystones are representative of the magnates of the region.

Libraria

From the early 16th century the university library was located here. The room was once also called the Objedziński room, named so after a professor who had donated a considerable amount of money for its construction. At present, the Libraria serves as the entrance to the main exhibition. Specific for its interior is the late-Gothic cross ceiling. A gilded Gothic-style portal called the Golden Gate (Porta Aurea) leads into the vestibule. Today the Libraria serves as the location for University Senate meetings.
